

Differences between rank of weighted score and rank of journal citations

The difference was calculated as the rank of the Sisk et al. weighted score minus the rank of the citation count. Average ranks were assigned for ties, so some ranks are fractional. A positive value indicates that a school's primary law journal ranked more favorably in citations than in the scholarly productivity of its faculty, as measured by the Sisk et al. weighted score. A negative value indicates the opposite.
